Psalm 147

1. Psalm 147 belongs with Psalms 146–150
2. Psalms 146–150 all begin and end with,
“Praise the Lord”
3. Psalm 147 calls us four times over (vv. 1,
7, 12 & 20) to “Praise the Lord”

At the dedication of the wall of Jerusalem, the Levites were sought out from where they lived and were brought to Jerusalem to celebrate joyfully the dedication with songs of thanksgiving and with the music of cymbals, harps and lyres.

Psalm 147 seems to have been written
for celebrating the rebuilding of the walls
of Jerusalem.

Under Nehemiah, the walls and gates were rebuilt in an amazing 52 days (Neh. 6:15) but the restoration of the Jews and the completion of the protective walls and gates took decades.

We're often in such a hurry that we get frustrated and discouraged by God's delay. Yet, what we read in a matter of seconds is the work of God over decades.

“The Lord builds up Jerusalem; he gathers the exiles of Israel. He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds. He determines the number of stars and calls them each by name. Great is our Lord and mighty in power; his understanding has no limit. The Lord sustains the humble but casts the wicked to the ground.”

Psalm 147:2-6

Three Cautions:

1. Unemployment
2. Overwork
3. Need for Balance

1. Do we check out after clocking in?
