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Matthew 18:5

δέχομαι (*dechomai*)

to accept, receive, take, and welcome

Dechomai asks one to accept an offer
deliberately and readily

“Welcome” is used:

- **Literally of things (Luke 2:28; 16:6-7; 22:17)**
- **Metaphorically of the Kingdom (Mark 10:15)**
- **Literally of persons (Luke 16:4; 9:11)**
